grant for up to



\$25,000 to improve their neighborhoods. This is a matching grant. Communities who are awarded this matching grant may match the grant monetarily or the equivalent of voluntary hours.

As you know, the Lynton Place Board submitted an application for this grant and was awarded the \$25,000 grant. The Board has decided match the grant using voluntary hours rather than matching the \$25,000. This means that the Lynton Place community needs to spend 1083 hours building, improving and bringing the community together. We are accomplishing this through community activities.



Improving your Curb Appeal

First impressions count, and your property's curb appeal could be improved through some simple landscaping efforts. But you don't have to be an expert to get started. Landscaping can improve your home's curb appeal and make your outdoor space more enjoyable, and that translates to a real boost in home value. A well-landscaped home will sell for an average of 5.5 to 12.7 percent more than a home without landscaping. And you don't need to hire a professional to landscape your lawn and garden - you can do it yourself.

- Landscaping for beginners or experts should always begin with a plan. Sketch out a map of your lawn and garden, using pencil and paper to plan out where you want to put trees, shrubs and beds. Decide now how much effort you want to put in, and what parts of the lawn you plan to focus on.
- Install landscaping fabric and cover it with

- rocks or mulch to keep weeds down (you'll cut holes in the fabric where you want to install plants).
- Native plants tend to be ideal choices because they're already adapted to your climate and soil conditions. They'll be easiest to grow and hardiest, and that means replacing fewer plants as you try to get your new garden beds established.
- Perennials are the way to go with landscaping, because they come back every year. Annuals must be replanted every year.
- Soaker hoses are the easiest way to irrigate flower beds. They're more efficient than sprinklers, because they deliver water directly to your plants' roots. Plus, they eliminate the need for someone to stand around holding a hose. Installing soaker hoses makes your landscaping as lowmaintenance as possible, which is more appealing to potential buyers.



City of Charlotte Waste Collection

All collection items need to be placed curbside no sooner than the day before your scheduled collection day and no later than **6:00 am** day of collection.

Garbage

All garbage is bagged and there is no gar-

bage outside the cart. Garbage outside the cart will not be collected.

- The garbage cart handle is facing the house and the lid is facing the street.
- The garbage cart is 3 feet away from all objects

Recycling

All recyclables are loose in the cart. Recyclables should not be bagged.

- cart. Plastic bags aren't accepted and should be recycled at local grocery stores. Styrofoam and plastic plates and cups should be thrown in the garbage.
- Tear cardboard into small pieces that will fit loosely into your cart. Please do not fold.
 - The recycling cart is 3 feet away from all objects.

Bulky Items

- 1.Call CharMeck 311 to schedule pick up.
- 2.Placing all items, directly in front of residence, close to the curb, 3 feet away from all objects.
- 3.Emptying all appliances and removing any doors on appliances.
- 4. Placing tape in the shape of an X across entire TV screens or any glass.



Begin a Good Condo Neighbor

Condo living has changed what it means to be a good neighbor.

Understanding Shared Space

Everything inside the door and walls of your suite belongs to you. The remainder of a condo building is shared space including your balcony.

Use Carpets or Rugs on Hardwood Floors

Hardwood floors do a poor job of absorbing sound. Most con-

dos have rules to mitigate the transmission of sound. Walking around in shoes, moving chairs to sit down and other daily actions can become disruptive to neighbours. Carpets or rugs do an excellent job of preventing these disruptive noises.

Respect Quiet Hours

Respect your neighbors' right to peaceful enjoyment. When entertaining guests, it is not advisable to offer alcohol too late into the evening. Keep the number of guests

> reasonable for the size of your condo suite. Take the entertaining off your balcony and indoors before 10 pm.

Respect the Outside Space

Condo living requires living in close proximity to neighbours. Those that choose condo living have a responsibility to their neighbours that differs

from other forms of housing. Respecting the rights of your neighbors is part of being a good neighbor. Throwing items over the balcony is a "no-no". Throwing any trash over the balcony should never occur. Being a good neighbor respects yourself and your neighbor.
