Why Install a CO2 Detector?



The U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission identified Carbon Monoxide as the leading cause of gas poisoning deaths in the U.S. Thousands of cases of illness, brain damage and death could be prevented if all homes had CO alarms. Choose an alarm listed with the Underwriters Laboratory (UL) or Canadian Approval Services (CAS). The alarm sounds a shrill

warning before the levels of Carbon Monoxide become immediately dangerous Carbon Monoxide is lighter than air. CO2 and O2 are products of complete combustion, CO is produced when there is incomplete combustion. If all 3 gases are spilled into an area the CO2 Carbon Dioxide will drop to the floor and the lighter CO Carbon Monoxide will always rise to the ceiling. If the alarm sounds, EVACUATE and call 911 Make certain to account for everyone. Let the Fire Department determine if there is Carbon Monoxide in the home.

Use Your Plastic Shopping Bags

Do you have a large number of plastic grocery bags in your pantry? Don't throw them away!. Make the most of your plastic bag stash **and**

keep your vehicle clean. Loop one handle around the gear stick or place it on the floor of vour car. Place your garbage in the bag. When the plastic bag is full, tie it up and throw it away in a garbage receptacle. Don't forget to keep a spare bag in your vehicle for the next round of garbage.



Cleaning Your Oven Racks

Even worse than cleaning your oven is cleaning your oven racks. It can be easily done.....in the bath-room.

- Place racks in a plastic garbage bag and spray with degreaser. Soak for 15 minutes. Rinse clean
- Place towels in the bottom of your bathtub
- You may also clean the racks by applying one of the following solution methods below:
 - Apply dishwashing (liquid or powder) and hot water and soak overnight, or
 - Cover with baking soda followed by vinegar. When the foaming stops, cover the racks with hot water and soak overnight, or
 - Apply a simple paste containing three parts baking soda, one part warm water and soak overnight, or
 - Combine some concentrated dish detergent with a 1/2 cup of kosher salt with the baking soda paste. Apply to racks.
- Rinse with warm water.
- Use vinegar on any tough spots.

Devonshire Court Covenant Review - Motor Vehicles

Living in a community with covenants provides clear rules and regulations to ensure that our neighborhood remains in pristine condition and property values remain high. Our covenant rules provide us with excellent guidance on motor vehicles kept on the premises.

No motor vehicles (other than private passenger vehicles which shall be currently licensed and inspected) boat, boat trailer, mobile home, motor home, trailer or any similar items shall be stored in or upon the common areas and facilities, unless placed upon a portion of the common areas which may be designated from time to time by the Board for the

storage of such items. The Board shall have the right to charge a fee for such storage at rates competitive with legal storage rates. Motorcycles which do not contain adequate muffler systems (as determined by the Board in its sole discretion) shall not be permitted on the condominium property.

Any (junked) vehicle that is inoperable that does not display a current license plat, has flat tires, is damaged or wrecked, etc. is in violation of the rules out-

> lined by the City of Charlotte which also includes Devonshire Court. As outlined in the City of Charlotte Code of Ordinances (Sec. 14-217). It is unlawful to leave a vehicle standing in front of an owner's residence when the vehicle does not have a license plat or has an expired license plate. Any illegally parked vehicles in Devonshire Court is subject to towing at the owners' expense. All vehicles parked at Devonshire Court should be in good working

order.

As stated in the Bylaws, commercial vehicles are <u>not</u> permitted to be parked in Devonshire Court.

Preventing Larceny from Vehicles

Please consider the following tips to prevent you from becoming a victim.

- Always lock your doors and roll up your windows.
- Never leave your car unattended with the engine running
- Never leave valuable items in your vehicle.
- Never leave registration/insurance card in the vehicle.
- Have your VIN etched on all the windows of the car
- Store packages in the trunk of your vehicle while shopping.
- Remove your telephone, iPod, purse, briefcase, backpack, cash and even loose change each time you leave your vehicle.
- Invest in an alarm system or theft deterrent device
- Park your car in the driveway rather than the street.
- Consider a car alarm for added protection.
- Call 911 if you see any suspicious activity.
